



Ian Wood is Professor of Early Medieval History at the University of Leeds. He has been guest professor at the Universities of Vienna and Århus, and has held research fellowships at the Netherlands Institute for Advance Study, the British School at Rome and Collegium Budapest, as well as a British Academy Readership. He was a co-ordinator of the European Science Foundation programme on the *Transformation of the Roman World* from 1992-8. He is a member of a HERA project on *Cultural Memory and the Resources of the Past, 400-1000 AD*.

Among his publications are *The Merovingian Kingdoms, 450-751* (1994); *The Missionary Life* (2001); *Avitus of Vienne. Letters and Selected Prose*, with Danuta Shanzer (2002); and *Fragments of History: Rethinking the Ruthwell and Bewcastle Monuments*, with Fred Orton and Clare Lees (2007). He has given the Jarrow, Brixworth and Lastingham Lectures (in 1995, 2008 and 2009). He is currently editing hagiographical works from Wearmouth-Jarrow, with Chris Grocock, and completing *The Modern Origins of the Early Middle Ages*, a study of interpretations of the Fall of Rome and the barbarian invasions from the eighteenth century to the present.
